### Twenty-second Dr. (Mrs.) Deepa Martins Memorial Lecture Our Climate, Our Responsibility, Our Legacy

The environment is not somebody

else's responsibility - it is ours



emorial lectures serve as a tribute to the enduring legacy of individuals whose lives have left a lasting impact on the world around them. Every year, the School commemorates the birth anniversary of its Founder Secretary, Dr. (Mrs.) Deepa

Martins, by inviting eminent speakers whose vision, values, and commitment continue to inspire generations.

This year, we were privileged to

have Ms. Sunita Narain—an environmentalist, writer, Director of the Centre for Science and Environment



(CSE), and Editor of *Down to Earth* magazine—as the keynote speaker at the Twenty-second Dr. (Mrs.) Deepa Martins Memorial Lecture, held on April 5, 2025. We were also honoured to have Ms. Aruna Roy, a renowned social activist and recipient of the Ramon Magsaysay Award, as our Guest of Honour.

Ms. Narain delivered the keynote address on the topic 'Climate Change: What Can We Do?' Her speech served as a wake-up call for every student. She began by highlighting the urgent environmental crisis the world faces today—global warming, melting glaciers, and rising sea levels—emphasizing that these are no longer distant threats but immediate realities impacting our lives.

She issued a stark warning about India's deteriorating air quality, particularly in cities like Delhi, where she remarked, "Soon, people might have to wear oxygen cylinders just to survive. This is not science fiction—this could be our future." Her words carried a powerful message: what affects one part of the world today can soon become a global concern.

Ms. Narain also elaborated on the concept of sustainability, urging us to rethink our everyday choices and the kind of world we are creating. She emphasized the urgent need to shift towards sustainable and renewable resources instead of relying on depleting fossil fuels like coal and petroleum. Only by making such

changes, she said, can we hope to build a green and livable future.

Despite the grave challenges, Ms. Narain concluded with a message of hope and responsibility. She

reminded us that even small actions, like planting a tree, can create meaningful change. Her most striking message was:

"The environment is not somebody else's responsibility—it is ours. The future belongs to you, and so does the duty to protect it."

The lecture inspired students to support environmental movements, raise awareness, and actively work toward conserving nature.

## VOICES FOR THE PLANET

## An Interview with Ms. Sunita Narain

Change works when people

understand and are supported

Q. India has faced some of its worst environmental catastrophes in recent years, be it the Uttarakhand crisis, the Chennai water crisis or the toxic air of Delhi. Do you believe these crises were preventable? If so, where are we going wrong with our prevention techniques?

Ms. Narain- Yes, I do believe these environmental crisis were preventable. But for that, we need to change the way we look at development. It's not about choosing between the environment and progress. We can and must develop in a way that respects nature. Take the Kedarnath tragedy, for example. While cloudbursts are natural and becoming more frequent due to climate change, the extent of the damage was made worse by how we've been building in the fragile Himalayan region. The Himalayas are young and prone to landslides, yet we've built on them as if they were the plains. That's where we're going wrong. I believe

we need to understand the unique ecology of each region and plan accordingly. If we develop with care and inclusivity, many of these disasters can definitely be avoided.

Q. Mega projects like Ken Betwa river link and coal mining expansions are displacing thousands of people and destroying forests. Do you think that India's development model values for nature and indigenous communities are enough? If not, what

Ms. Narain- No, I don't think India's current development model values nature and indigenous communities enough. While we have a rich tradition of respecting nature and cultural diversity, our development approach—like in the case of coal mining and the Ken-Betwa project—often overlooks these values. I understand that we need minerals, even for clean energy, but they're often found in regions rich in forests and water, that are home to tribal communities. Extracting resources without considering the impact leads to

displacement and ecological loss. I believe we must find a balance. Development should benefit local communities, protect forests, and create sustainable livelihoods through a forest-based economy. We need a new economic model that includes both progress and preservation.

Q. Did you have any role model or a mentor who guided you in your journey?

Ms. Narain- Yes, I've had many role models and mentors who shaped my journey. My first and strongest role model was my mother. After my father passed away when I was just eight, she raised my four sisters and me with great strength. I come from a family of five generations of literate women, and I feel I owe everything to them, especially to my mother. If she didn't give up as a young widow, how can I give up today?

Professionally, I learned a lot from my colleague Shri Anil

Agarwal, who helped me understand the deep link between environment and development, especially how the environment is crucial for the survival of the poor.

Role models are often those around us: people we may not even realize are guiding us. We just need to learn to recognize and value them.

Q. What are the reasons behind Cherrapunji and Mawsynram in Meghalaya receiving some of the heaviest rainfall in the world, yet the nearby capital, Shillong, being one of the most water-scarce areas of India?

Ms. Narain- Great question! The issue isn't just how much it rains, but it is about our relationship with water. Places like Cherrapunji get 14 meters of rain, yet face scarcity because the water isn't stored or used wisely. In contrast, drier places like Jaisalmer or Ajmer (which get around 500 mm of rain) traditionally managed water well through rainwater harvesting—every home was connected to water collection systems. I recall being



asked to remove my shoes before stepping onto a rooftop in Jodhpur because it was an 'agor': a clean space for capturing rainwater. This shows how deeply society respected water.

Today, we've lost that connection. Lakes and drains are polluted because we don't see them as sacred. In the past, building a lake or stepwell was considered a noble act. Modern India must revive that spirit and treat every water body like a place of worship. Our survival depends on rebuilding that respectful relationship with nature.

Q. Did you ever make a decision for the sake of the environment, even when it went against the public opinion?

Ms. Narain: You can't go against people, you have to take them along. When we pushed for CNG in Delhi to reduce air pollution, there was resistance initially, especially from auto-rickshaw drivers. But we explained the health benefits and helped them get loans for new vehicles. Change works when people understand and are supported. However, harmful actions like throwing plastic in lakes must be strictly stopped, even if people resist.

## Orientation Programme Pre-Primary Laying the foundation for a lifelong love of learning.

he Pre-Primary Parent Orientation Programme was held on March 27, 2025. The programme aimed to foster a strong parent-school partnership for the holistic development of the child. The event began with a warm welcome by the School management team and provided an overview of the School's visionary Founders, Mission, Vision, and Core Values, highlighting its focus on experiential learning. The School's alignment with the National Education Policy (NEP) 2020 and the National Curriculum Framework (NCF) was also highlighted with a focus on integrating these principles into both the curriculum and pedagogical practices.

The significance of early childhood education was emphasized, particularly through play-based, activity-based, and inquiry-based learning approaches. Parents were introduced to the Holistic Progress Card, an assessment tool designed to evaluate a child's cognitive, emotional, social, and physical development. Additionally, the innovative Jodo Gyan Math learning approach was showcased aimed at making mathematics engaging and interactive for young learners. 




